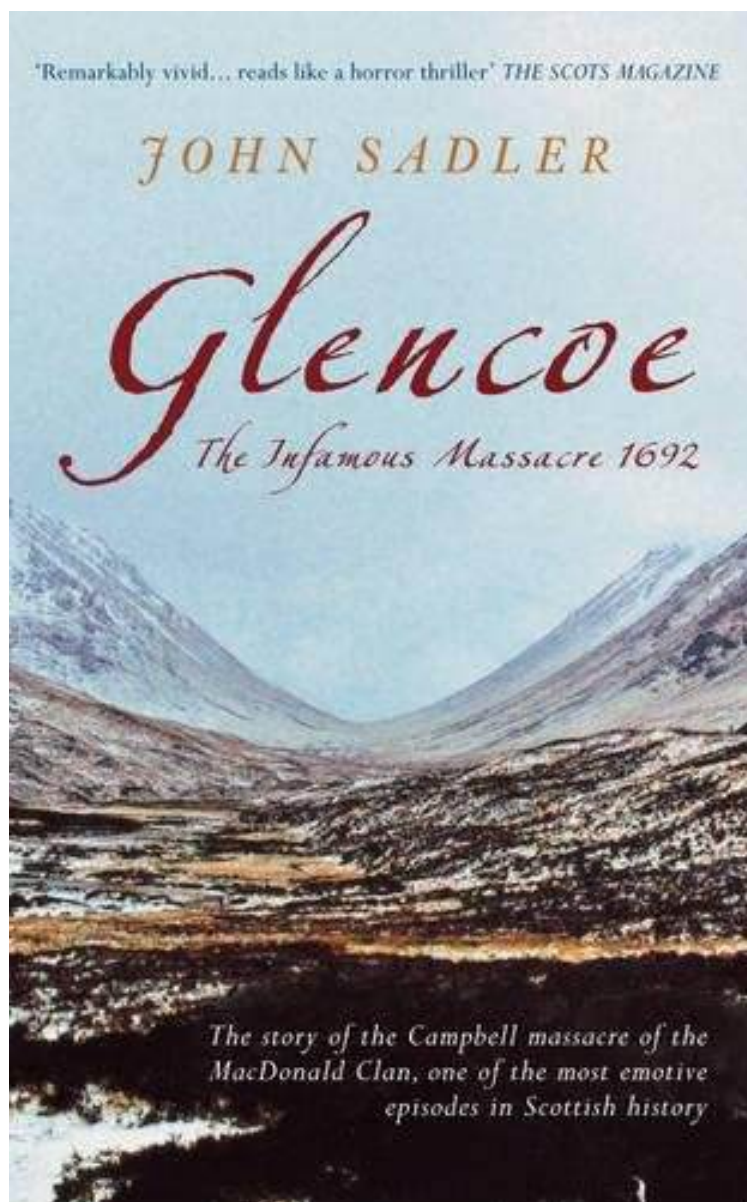

2 of 3 review helpful Poorly written rehash By Terry Wieland This is a very poorly written rehash of the information contained in John Prebble's classic Contrary to the breathless jacket blurbs it contains no new information or insights on the incident From the rampant grammatical and spelling errors it appears that no editor looked at the copy and it was never proof read There are also some serious technical mistakes A startling new history of the Campbell massacre of the McDonald Clan one of the most emotive episodes in Scottish history In the early hours of 13 February 1692 English Redcoats under the command of Campbell of Glenlyon who for the past week had been peacefully quartered on the inhabitants of Glencoe fell upon their MacDonald hosts In the ensuing hours 38 defenceless men women and children were murdered in cold blood The massacre sanctioned by the new king of England
